With over a hundred years of serving the community of Gallup and the surrounding reservation communities, Rehoboth has left an impact on the Southwest. In most cases, graduates of any institution leave their alma mater and it remains a memory thereafter.

Rehoboth has been fortunate to have former students pursue education and careers outside of the community and return to aid the mission and renew their commitment to the Rehoboth family. This season, we have highlighted staff that attended Rehoboth. Q: What was your overall experience attending Rehoboth?

AN: I had some great teachers and I enjoyed learning. I love that Rehoboth is small enough that I could try everything. I didn't have to specialize in the one or two things I was really good at. I liked the variety.

CM: Playing basketball, running track, commuting from Zuni, NM everyday, choir tours and being on the original "Stomp" team

CJ: Positive. Teachers were welcoming and supportive. I was inspired to be a teacher myself from the staff at Rehoboth.

DB: I loved attending Rehoboth, it always felt more like a family than a school.

EL: I transferred from Window Rock School District and Rehoboth was the first place I saw diversity and a true sense of community. I was able to pursue interests that were outside of core curriculum and was encouraged to do so. I felt like I could be myself at Rehoboth.

EY: I got along with people.

PI: I loved RCS as a student. I remember building castles in 4th grade, learning about South America in 6th grade, all the amazing integrated units in middle school and being involved in as much as possible in high school.

VL: I loved that Rehoboth was a place for me to be a part of various activities that helped me experience many opportunities. I was able to play volleyball and try track (was never good at all, haha!), Editor of the yearbook and school newspaper, as well as, National Honors Society and lead as the Student Council President. Through these experiences, it helped me develop lifelong skills.

Q: What has been your experience working at Rehoboth? EY: Friday night movies in the Kuipers Gym.

AN: The staff is great! I particularly like getting to know bus drivers on trips. They are funny and have another perspective of the school and the students. Working with them enriches my life.

CM: It has been a blessing to work here at Rehoboth. To be a part of a solid team of hardworking teachers is a lot of fun. The community of the staff outside of school is also something I appreciate.

CJ: I have learned many great aspects of great teaching. The staff are very supportive and collaborative.

DB: It's been wonderful to experience and learn first hand what it takes to keep this wonderful school running. Everything from the financial support to the support of volunteers. We have so many people who love Rehoboth and support us through prayer, volunteering and financial support.

EL: I've been here for almost a year. I've really been enjoying it! It was eye opening when I first started. I didn't realize how much work the staff and volunteers really do, and how much of it goes unnoticed by students. I was so unaware of the commitment and responsibility everyone takes on. It's made me appreciate my schooling so much more than when I was a student here.

EY: Teacher, Coach, Artist.

PI: I've loved working at RCS. For the past two years, we've gone as a staff to Cross Canyon at the beginning of the year. There's a great stream and water hole there and though I wasn't planning on swimming, I was convinced to jump in anyway! Those types of community building experiences are so typical at Rehoboth. Also, the first day of school, the elementary and middle school staff join together to pray and sing the doxology. Hearing those words echo through the middle school commons is a powerful beginning to a school year. I love working with this staff, these students and their families.

VL: My favorite part of being a staff member is to work with some of my previous teachers. Its so good to know they have continued here at Rehoboth and believe in the mission that they now call New Mexico home. Mr. Ippel who was my former choir teacher is now Bob, my executive director and boss. I also enjoy meeting our new staff who come to NM not sure what to expect but are on their journey and have responded to God's calling. I love to watch them grow as staff members and become immersed in our Native community.

Q: Favorite memory or story as a student?

AN: My senior year was a good one! We were State Champs in both boys and girls cross country, so our whole team celebrated! The girls basketball team went all the way in state to play for third place! The senior class trip was a lot of fun at Lake Powell. I have good memories of my friends and classmates, we worked well together and laughed a lot.

CM: Smashing Bob Ippel's van into the fence by the old church when he asked me to quick transport some supplies across campus during choir one day. **CJ**: Senior Trip to Lake Powell!

DB: Making friends and staying friends even to this day. EL: Choir Tour, pretty much all of the tours that I got to go on. My favorite tour was when Cantabile went to Southern California. We visited some pretty awesome schools and churches.

PI: I loved the wide variety of things that I could participate in as a student: musicals, band, choir, English Expo, Science Olympiad, discipleship training. All of these activities were wonderful!

VL: As a student, one of my favorite memories was being in Art class with Mr. Yazzie (Elmer since we're colleagues now, haha!). Back in the day, we were able to just get in the back of his truck and for one morning for class we went to Churchrock to draw and paint. We had a small class (5 of us) and we sat in back of his 50's classic green chevy truck that had a camper with all his grilling items hanging for camping.

Q: Advice for Graduates?

AN: Try everything! Don't worry about whether or not your friends are in it. You already know most people at the school. Also, if you're interested, someone can teach you and if you learn something, it may help you down the road. Trying something new will at least make you a better learner, and maybe even a better person.

CM: When you move on from here, ask God to give you clear ideas about how you can influence the lives of your neighbors.

EL: Put God first and you'll be amazed what He'll do in your life. It's okay if things don't happen overnight. Work hard, and don't give up!

EY: Seek humility.

PI: Don't be afraid to come back and work in Gallup/ Rehoboth. There are some really wonderful people, and some great opportunities.

VL: God is always with you. "But you, Lord, are a shield around me, my glory, the One who lifts my head high."-Psalm 3:3 You will always be a part of Rehoboth's community and continuing story. Know that we are consistently praying for you as graduates and in your walk of life. We want to see you excel in the plans God has for you. Stay true!

Teach For Transformation: Early Adopters

Last year, Rehoboth began its journey with a program called Teaching for Transformation (TFT) which equips Christian schools with excellent instructional tools as well as a framework for bringing

a Christian perspective to their students' experience. This year, eight teachers and two administrators from the elementary, middle, and high schools are serving as "Early Adopters" of TFT-working to integrate the practices and principles in their own classrooms and buildings. The group is partnering with a similar cohort from Zuni Christian Mission School to receive training, provide accountability, and share ideas with each other.

The TFT program focuses on the big story of God's world and emphasizes that we are participants in this story, furthering the cause of God's Kingdom. Each of us brings a unique perspective to that story that builds in us a deep hope for the lasting effects of our work and the

transformative power it will have on others and the world. Armed with that story and that hope, teachers construct specific learning experiences for their students to help them see their places and roles in God's plan as well. TFT is about ensuring that all of our subject areas are anchored in the Good News of the Gospel and that our school

produces knowledgeable, skilled young people who are passionate about the Lord and His work.

Next year, the entire staff will receive the training experienced by this year's smaller group, allowing the early adopters to serve as mentors for their colleagues on the journey. Both Rehoboth and

Zuni are excited to embrace the work of TFT while expressing it through a voice and perspective that are distinct to the native peoples we serve.

Every year the mid school students get the Peter Fish containers, and they go out and ask friends and family for change so they can purchase items to put in Christmas baskets. The mid school teachers then take the students to Wal-Mart to fill baskets with necessities and a few extra goodies. Everyone has a lot of fun and the energy that goes into putting these baskets together is phenomenal. The baskets then go to people that need a little extra help during the Christmas season.

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On Christmas Eve, my daughter and I took some baskets to a man named, Daniel, who works really hard. He walks to Highway 491 every morning at 5:00 A.M. to catch a ride to take him to work. He works at two fast food places and he hitchhikes home everyday, no matter the weather. He is blessed with a family but, they have a hard time making ends meet.

When we got to his hogan, Daniel came out to greet us. We told Daniel what we were doing, and we helped him carry the baskets into the warm, cozy hogan. It has a dirt floor and a stove right in the center of the hogan. The hogan was sparsely furnished so we placed the baskets on the ground. Daniel turned to us with tears in his eyes and said to me, "You are taking your mother's place. She was always good to us and blessed my family and me with food." I was extremely touched by that. Then he said, "Tell all the kids and teachers thank you for me. It's amazing how God blesses me everyday!" What a blessing the Rehoboth community is and how blessed we are to hear such wonderful testimonies of God's love no matter who we are or where we are from.



School Highlights:

Syrian Refugee Art Exchange

This fall, the kindergarten through sixth grade students created art that we exchanged with Syrian refugees. These refugees were the same age as the students who created the art. This is the first year that the elementary has been able to join in the Memory Project's work, an organization that promotes world peace through art and poetry. We spent some time learning a little about where Syria is located, the war taking place there and what life might be like in a refugee camp. Students then made art to represent their wishes for the student who would receive their art. The students drew kindness. They painted friendship. There were drawings of our peaceful land and fun, abstract art. The elementary artists worked impressively hard to get their pieces just right. Some students worked six weeks in a row to finish. They each gave something very personal to show how much they care about these children from Syria. On the back of each piece of artwork was a photograph of the artist and their handprint. The hands were traced on the back of each piece so that the students can symbolically touch one another. This was a beautiful way to share the love of God through the making and sharing of art.











Chaplaincy Program

I want to ask for your prayers and introduce you to a couple of aspects of our chaplaincy program through the use of scripture. First, II Kings 6:8-23 tells a fascinating story in which Elisha's servant was found panicking as the Syrian Army surrounded their city. However, Elisha wasn't anxious at all, he saw God's angel army surrounding the Syrian Army. Elisha understood that God was greater than the problem at hand. Elisha asked the Lord to open his servant's eyes so he too may see that God was bigger than the problem at hand. At Rehoboth, we have staff, students, families of students, and graduates who, like all of us, live in a world packed with disappointments, sin, trials, tragedies, griefs, and traumas. As the chaplain of Rehoboth Christian School, it's my privilege, and really of all of our staff, to be Elisha's. We get to come alongside people God deeply loves, not minimizing their hurts or pains, but helping them see that there is a God who is greater than anything they're facing! Elisha's name means 'God is my salvation.' Pray that God will use Rehoboth to clearly make known the salvation of God found in Christ alone.



Second, in Matthew 9:35-38, Jesus was ministering with compassion throughout Galilee. He told His disciples (most likely with tears and passion), "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest." In my opinion, this verse should be at the center of all Christian education. We want our students to know Jesus and His passion for the 'least of these.' We get to share this vision with our students through modeling and teaching. One of my favorite things I do as a chaplain is to network with local ministries and organizations, finding ways to introduce and involve our students in what God is doing in our community. For example, on most Thursdays, I get to bring students to help feed the homeless a meal. The students not only hand out food but also sit down with the homeless asking questions like, "I'm in high school, what advice would you give me?" The conversations that flow from that one question are always amazing.

Please pray that each of our students will know very personally the call of Jesus to follow Him and be fishers of men.











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

Financial Needs Update:

As Executive Director I hear many reasons why people are choosing Rehoboth Christian School. While many families choose Rehoboth because it offers Christian education, a significant number choose Rehoboth because of challenges facing the child or the family. They are looking for hope. We love supporting parents, guardians, grandparents, and their children as they seek something better. We try very hard to offer a safe community, good academic and emotional support, and the good news of the Gospel which redefines life.

Providing the excellent support needed for Rehoboth students requires more staff. Last year our Advancement Office was tasked to raise additional money so that we could expand our elementary/middle school counseling position into a full time position. While the school receives some federal money for supporting students academically, the need to have a full-time special education person to serve the middle and high school is clear. Rehoboth is thankful for Christian brothers and sisters around the country who generously support our students through their faithful prayer and financial giving.

Rehoboth is also blessed to have volunteers who are willing to support students by coming alongside the Rehoboth staff. While most volunteers come down for a few weeks or a month, we are so appreciative of our long term volunteers who help us for even longer periods of time. For the 2020-21 school year, we are looking for a long term volunteer who would be willing to be placed in the elementary school. This long term volunteer would receive training in occupational and/or physical therapy exercises for students who qualify but do not currently receiving these services. Whether you are retired, just out of college, or need a sabbatical from your current job, we would love to talk to you about the possibilities of living and working at Rehoboth. 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
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
