TUITION ASSISTANCE

We are well on our way into the second quarter of the school year. We are grateful for the gifts in support of our tuition assistance program totaling \$690,910 through October 23 which represents 35% of our annual need of \$2 million. With your continued support, we can continue to provide an affordable Christian Education for the students and families in our community.

SALT PROGRAM (Students All Learning Together)

This year, the financial need for our SALT Program is \$380,993. Families across our community turn to Rehoboth because of the incredible care and expertise of our SALT staff—helping students thrive when they need extra support. Through October 23, we have received gifts to the SALT program totaling \$30,265. We ask for your support for this program so we can ensure every child can be provided with the educational resources they need throughout the 2025-26 school year.
